- The most common route of transmission of HBV is:

  - eating raw seafood and shellfish from infected sources
  - drinking fluids with contaminated ice
  - parenterally from blood transfusions, needlesticks, contaminated needles.
- Factors that promote the progression or severity of HCV include:
  - increased alcohol intake, age greater than 40 years at time of infection, male gender
  - female gender, recent childbirth, increased alcohol intake
  - illegal injection drug use, transfusions or organ transplants, needle sticks
  - multiple sexual partners before age 18 years, male gender, needle sticks
- Household transmission of HCV is:
  - common and must be prevented
  - rare and may occur through blood exposure
  - possible to reduce by limiting sexual partners
  - occurs through breast feeding
- HDV:
  - only occurs in the presence of HAV
  - relies on the HEV virus to spread
  - always occurs in presence of HBV
  - is endemic in southwestern U.S.
- HEV is most commonly associated with:
  - drinking caffeinated iced beverages
  - eating meat that is cooked to the well done stage
  - not receiving timely vaccinations for HEV
  - fecally contaminated drinking water
- The most common side effects of HAV vaccination are:
  - high fevers for 2 days, nausea and vomiting for 1 day
  - injection site soreness, headache, appetite loss, malaise
  - appetite loss, severe nausea and vomiting for 24 hours
  - headaches, myalgias, nausea and vomiting for 24 hours
- Individuals who have the following should not receive the HBV vaccine:
  - life threatening allergy to baker's yeast
  - previous vaccination within 6 months
  - if they have not completed the HBV series
  - less than 3 months of age at the time

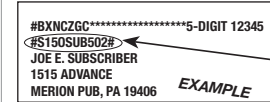
